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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Sree Sankara College was founded in the year 1954 by Swami Agamananda, an educationist and foresighted scholar. It became a First Grade college in 1956 and affiliated to the then Travancore university. Later the institution became a part of Kerala University. The college got UGC recognition in 1957 under 2(f) 12 (B). At present the college is affiliated to Mahatma Gandhi University.

The Sringeri Mutt took over the administration of the college in 1960. His Holiness Sri Sri Bharathitheertha Mahaswamigal and Sri Sri Vidhushekharabharathi are our patrons. They guide and steer the administration of the college through a Board of Directors. Guru Seva Dhurina Padmasree Gowri Shankar is the administrator and Sri K. Anand, a leading Advocate is the Managing Director.

The students of the college represent a wide spectrum of the society. Though the majority of students belong to the lower middle class, the college produces 4-6 ranks in the UG and PG programmes every year. That students from all classes and creeds study here, bear ample testimony to the tolerance and inclusiveness practiced by the college right from its inception.

The college started new programmes incorporating vocational and skill development components in the UG Curriculum. The College is the first affiliated College in Kerala to start B.Voc programmes under the Deen Dayal Upadhyay Kaushal Kendra.

The dedicated well qualified teaching community is one of the greatest assets of the institution. 39 faculty members have Ph.D., 20 have M.Phil. degrees and 8 have Post Doctoral Research experience.

Response:

The college was founded in the year 1954 by Swamy Agamananda, a social reformer and a foresighted scholar of Sri Ramakrishna Advaita Ashram. In June 1960, the patronage of the college became vested in His Holiness the Jagadguru Sri Sri Sankaracharya Swamigal of Dakshinamnaya Sree Sarada Peetam, Sringeri. Currently, Sri Sri Sankaracharya Swamigal of Sringeri Mutt steers the administration through a Board of Directors, headed by Advocate K. Anand as the Managing Director.

The vision of Sree Sankara College is “to achieve excellence in higher Education, with a stress on, creativity, personal values and human development.” The Institution’s mission is to perpetuate the teachings of Adi Sankaracharya in whose name this abode of learning has been established, i.e., “to mould good citizens with ingenuity, adaptability and social commitment and ethical values that can provide innovative leadership in all walks of life.” In addition to this, the mission of Sree Sankara College is to achieve excellence in higher education with a stress on creativity, skill development, employability, personal values and human development.

The affiliating university through its academic bodies such as Boards of Studies and Academic Council formulates the curriculum for all the programmes. At the College Level, the implementation of the curriculum has been monitored by the College Council, which is a statutory advisory body, chaired by the Principal.

The College Council with the support of the IQAC, which includes the teachers -in -charge of all departments, structures the broad plan for the academic year in tune with the Academic calendar of the university. This includes:

- the schedule for the commencements of classes for each semester,
- the conduct of the In-semester Examinations at the college level,
- the conduct of PTA meetings at the Departmental level and the college level, and the submission of the Internal assessment marks/grades to the University through the Principal.
- Afterwards, the respective departments prepare the detailed academic calendar for the course/programme they offer. This includes the timetable for

- 1.the class work,
- 2.the assignments,
- 3.seminars,
- 4.tests and
- 5.Project work.

The IQAC monitors the curriculum delivery. As per the academic plan of the department for the

programme, the class work, the assignments, the seminars, surprise tests and periodical tests are held.

Workshops, exhibitions, competitions, debates, quiz and poster presentations are also held. The interactive sessions with eminent scholars are also organized.

Teaching-learning aids like models, charts, smart boards and LCD projectors are used.

The college supplies man power to various industries and research bodies. On the other hand, for the effective operationalization of curriculum, links with various bodies and institutions have been established.

The College has established 13 MOUs and 42 Linkages that enable students of various departments to do their project work.

The students are motivated to do their project work in such firms. The experts from the firms visit the college and interact with the students.

In addition, yearly visits of student groups to factories, botanical gardens, zoological parks, and other institutions enrich the learning experience of the students.

Distinct, specific courses have been offered for various programmes at the Under Graduate and Post Graduate Levels.

Under Graduate Level

Common Course in English provides the students with ample opportunities to assimilate the basic principles (having a strong bearing on the democratic framework of the country) about, and formulate convictions through the writings of Scholars, Activists and literary artists on issues related to Gender, Environment, Globalisation, Secularism, and Nationalism.

Core, Complementary and Elective Courses aim at an overall development in competency on the one hand, and the inculcation of essential values. Each programme has courses that give the students a comprehensive view of the issues. All UG students study the courses as an integral part of the curriculum designed by the university.

Post Graduate Level

Apart from the basic orientation that the students get at the UG Level, all the Post Graduate Programmes have been designed in such a manner that the various ethical and social dimensions are made part of the prospective career development.

(Eg: PG Microbiology students study the course 'Environmental Microbiology.' This empowers them to take up jobs in firms related to food industry, Mineral Water Plants and Water Theme Parks.)

Moreover, in pursuance of the Order of the Honourable Supreme Court of India, the Syllabi for all the UG programmes (introduced in the year 2017) have been devised to include the issues under consideration.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students, after admission and organises special programs for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

The admissions for the Undergraduate and Postgraduate programmes are processed by the university through a single window system – Centralized Allotment Process (CAP), Mahatma Gandhi University.

The departments of Statistics, Commerce, Microbiology, Hindi, Sanskrit, Economics conduct Bridge courses to help students cope with the advanced syllabus.

After the commencement of classes, a class test to assess the comprehension ability, general awareness, is conducted under the supervision of the class tutor. Based on the results, the advanced learners and slow learners are identified.

For Slow learners:

The slow learners thus identified are brought under the purview of ‘Scholar Support Programme’, a scheme launched by the Government of Kerala. In addition, the slow learners are given special attention and remedial programmes are arranged by the class tutors. Additional classes are organized to shed light on doubts, re-explaining of essential topics for improving performance.

For Advanced Learners:

The advanced learners are brought under the purview of ‘Walk With A Scholar’ scheme. Advanced learners are identified through their performance in examinations, In addition, through their interface in class room and laboratories, their understanding of concepts, articulation abilities are assessed. These students are assigned individual investigatory projects or assignments to enrich their academic acumen. Each student is provided with a mentor to groom them to realize their potential. They are also encouraged to present papers in National and International level seminars.

Strategies adopted for scholar enhancement:

1. Remedial lessons are structured to make clear doubts.
2. Re-explaining of vital topics for improving performance
3. Supplementary fine points are given in each class on the subject of the topic.
4. Students can talk about their individual issues with teachers for proper assistance.
5. The students are continuously exposed to seminars, discussions and interactive sessions with eminent personalities.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process**2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences****Response:**

The institution promotes the creation and maintenance of a learner centric environment and adoption of participatory learning process. The focus in teaching-learning process has been placed on both the academic, classroom oriented experiences and on the participatory learning space facilitated by the departments through a series of activities. Every department through the activities help in offering and creating in students a first-hand experience of their subject of study in addition to developing team work, organizational skills, leadership qualities, financial management and enhancing their resourcefulness. Learning is made student centric through interactive lectures and appropriate strategies adopted by faculty to cater to diverse needs, and the introduction of new methods of teaching.

- The lecture method is effectively supplemented by interactive methods like group discussions or debates. Apart from this, the learning process is made student centered by assigning individual investigatory projects in all PG and UG programmes. This contributes to self-management of knowledge development and skill formation. It is also designed to equip the students with a basic knowledge of research methodology.
- The student seminars, quizzes, study tours organized by the departments annually have been found to be very effective methods of teaching and learning. Seminars help students to survey the topic and presents his/her learning ahead of the entire class.
- Quizzing based on the topics exposed in the class has been a motivating Interactive Student-centered activity.
- Subject related exhibitions in which students create posters, working models and presentations are conducted by various departments. This helps in enhancing the learning experience of the students
- The activities and camps of NSS and NCC help students by introducing them to true life situations and issues of rural areas and help to present their knowledge to the entire class. This helps other students know about rural problems and the presenter grows in confidence. The participation of students in the activities of NSS and NCC provides a lot of real life experiences among the young generation. These real life experiences inculcate social values and soft skills among students.
- Faculty members also adapt role plays, puzzles, case studies, and debates to make learning more motivating.

Faculty members constantly seek to update their teaching and evaluation methods. Orientation, refresher and training programmes provide opportunities for faculties to equip themselves in acquiring innovative teaching and evaluation methods.

The Chalk and Talk method is supplemented with the use of Audio-Visual aids, digital resources, seminar presentations by students, quizzes and experiential learning.

- Synergy the Classroom Theatre- An innovative teaching-learning practice that combines theatre and classroom. The course content is enacted by the teacher. The synergy classroom theatre by Dr. C. K. Sujeesh of the English department has been conducted in other campuses as well.
- The department of Economics conducted an innovative training programme on “Teaching Economics through Cartoons.”
- Teachers are encouraged to make use of learning platforms like edmodo, g-suite for the administration, documentation, tracking, reporting and delivery of educational courses or training programs. They help the instructor deliver material to the students, administer tests and other assignments, track student progress, and manage record-keeping.
- A travel desk functions in the college which enable the students of B.Voc Tourism and Hospitality undergo training in Tour Operations, Ticketing and Hotel Management.
- Films based on prescribed texts, historical films and those based on the lives of important personalities in various fields, are screened, to give the students a better learning experience.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Reforms in Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level

Response:

The evaluation process and feedback mechanism of the college is transparent. The evaluation process is described in the College Calendar which is in accord with the Rules and Regulations of the Mahatma Gandhi University. The process is also made available through the College Website The institution follows distinctive and open system.

The evaluation of each programme consists of two components: an internal or In-semester assessment and an external or End-semester assessment. The institution conducts a minimum of two internal examinations as stipulated by the university. In addition, departments also conduct class tests as part of continuous evaluation. This helps in evaluating the students regularly. Besides the customary written exams, student seminars and presentations are conducted to evaluate the students.

Theory examinations are conducted strictly as per the rules and regulation of the University in a translucent and secure manner. The institute follows continuous evaluation/assessment on the foundation of curriculum. The layout is 80% semester end exam and 20% internal assessment for the Under Graduate programmes and 75% and 25% for the Post Graduate programmes. The internal assessment comprises of

- Internal Test I

- Internal Test II
- Assignments /Seminar Presentations
- Attendance

Seminars and Presentations are conducted and valuation is done by the respective teachers. Subject based quiz and Open book test papers are some of the innovative initiatives to evaluate the students. Each student is intimated about the format for calculating internal marks and given an opportunity for rechecking and registering their grievances, if any, before they are sent to University.

2.5.2 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and variety

Response:

The college follows internal assessment in a transparent way that every student has an idea about the standard internal evaluation process of the theory and practical subjects. The regulations of Mahatma Gandhi University are strictly adhered to and marks for the examinations (theory and practical) are displayed on the department notice boards.

The weightage for internal assessment is based on University regulations. Consolidated weightage based on two internal examinations, attendance, seminar and assignment is given for theory papers. For practical examination weightage is given as per the University norms. Assignments and seminars provide scope for assessing independent learning and communication skills.

Marks obtained in every single assessment are recorded and filed at the department level.

Transparency in Internal Assessment

Subsequent to evaluation, the answer scripts of internal class tests/assignments are returned to the students. Students have the freedom to express grievances if any regarding the marks accorded.

Internal evaluation grade sheets are published in the departmental notice boards and kept in the department for further reference. Re-examinations are conducted for absentees in internal examinations by the teacher's concerned.

Class wise Parent Teacher meetings are held after the internal examinations. The performances of the students are communicated to the parents during the parent teacher meetings of each department, and students are guided to improve their performances. Remedial classes are provided to students who score low marks in the examination.

A three tier Grievance Redressal mechanism for internal examinations functions in the college the details of which are published in the college calendar.

2.5.3 Mechanism to deal with examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient

Response:

A Students Grievance Redressal Cell functions in the College as prescribed by Mahatma Gandhi University, to which the college is affiliated. As per the regulations of the university, the college follows a three tier redressal system, the details of which are published in the college calendar.

Subsequent to evaluation, the answer scripts of internal class tests/assignments are returned to the students. Students have the freedom to express grievances if any regarding the marks accorded. Internal evaluation grade sheets are also published in the departmental notice boards and kept in the department for further reference.

Discrepancies, if any, shall be brought to the notice of the teacher concerned. If the grievance is not addressed effectively, the students can submit their grievance in writing to the principal who is also the chairman of the cell. The cell will meet as and when it is required and take suitable solutions for the grievance addressed it, failing which the matter shall be directed to the university. However, no such issues have cropped up in the college.

2.5.4 The institution adheres to the academic calendar for the conduct of CIE**Response:**

The spirit of democracy and the participation of all are ensured in the preparation and organizing of the teaching – learning and evaluation schedules and preparation of the academic calendar for the college. At the beginning of every academic year the College Council meets to prepare and approve the academic calendar for the year. It is published in the College Calendar and Handbook and copies are made available to students and staff.

The faculty members of the concerned departments congregate the lists of courses for the coming semester. The head of the department finalizes the course allocation for the faculty members based on their choice and area of interest or expertise. Each department prepares the timetable as per the general time table of the college and the guidelines of relevant statutory bodies for the number of credit hours for each subject prior to the commencement of the semester.

Teachers keep record of their daily work. Meetings of the IQAC, College Council and departments are held at regular intervals to review the progress of the academic plan and suggest remedial measures wherever required. Details about the examination system, the pattern/types of questions, number of questions to be answered in each section, weights/marks/credits for each question, and the like are published in the College Handbook and University website.

2.6 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes**2.6.1 Program outcomes, program specific outcomes and course outcomes for all programs offered by the Institution are stated and displayed on website and communicated to teachers and students****Response:**

The institution offers a range of programmes to choose from, both at the graduate and post graduate level. They are also given options to choose regular or self financing streams. Mahatma Gandhi University to which the college is affiliated, shapes the curriculum of the courses. Hence the programme outcomes, programme specific outcomes and course outcomes are defined at the university level by the Academic Council and Board of Studies and are incorporated in the syllabus. Every department ensures that a copy of the syllabus is maintained. The students are made aware of the learning outcomes through the Principal's address in the beginning of the academic year in the form of induction programme. The faculty of every subject explains course objectives, evaluation pattern, marking scheme and the like to the students.

2.6.2 Attainment of program outcomes, program specific outcomes and course outcomes are evaluated by the institution

Response:

The institution offers three programmes B A, B Sc. and B Com. The Programme outcomes are evaluated on the basis of the annual enrolment demand and pass out of students in the different programmes. The institution experiences cent percent admission to the sanctioned strength including marginal increase. The demand ratio for B. Com is highest.

The programme specific out comes are determined at the department levels. The student progression details are collected and collated in each department serves as an indicator. Thirteen percent of the students in all programmes seek higher studies while the rest find employment in government, private and self-employment.

Each course of the different programmes are evaluated based on internal Assessment conducted at the institutional level and external examination conducted by the university. The components of the internal assessment include seminars, assignments, projects, viva voce and test papers. The comprehensive evaluation of the students is based on a five-point scale.

3.2 Innovation Ecosystem

3.2.1 Institution has created an ecosystem for innovations including incubation centre and other initiatives for creation and transfer of knowledge

Dr. APJ Abdul Kalam Innovation Challenge

Adi Sankara group of institutions has setup an innovation centre - BOOT camp – which is a joint venture of Adi Shankara Institute of Engineering and Technology, Sree Sankara College, and Sree Sarada Vidyalaya. With the support from NASSCOM, Kerala Start-up Mission and Red FM, every year BOOT camp conducts Dr. APJ Abdul Kalam Innovation Challenge which aims at promoting innovations among the students. This is coordinated by Dr. Ajay Basil, ASIET, Kalady, Dr. Preethi Nair of Sree Sankara College and Ms. Rekha Pillai of Sree Sarada Vidyalaya. Awards are given in various categories such as best project, project design, socially relevant project and innovation idea. Some of the projects have reached to an application level leading to start-up firms.

Students from Sree Sankara College regularly participate in the competition. In 2016, two students from Sree Sankara College were selected to the final round. Rahul Mohan of DC II Physics received Special Jury award for his “Machine Care giving system for dementia patients”. He came up with an algorithm to systematise the appropriate routine for dementia patients. This has been coded in Ubuntu Linux platform and it can any run in any device based on Ubuntu.

Sree Vyas Narayanan of DC I Chemistry and Thasni of DC I Commerce developed a mobile application that would incorporate all study materials and assignments of school students. They reached the final round of Innovation Challenge and were encouraged to participate in Innovation Challenge conducted by Mahatma Gandhi University. 4.3 IT Infrastructure

4.3.1 Institution frequently updates its IT facilities including Wi-Fi

Response:

The Campus was earlier connected via Ubuntu Sever. Only three output via LAN was provided, through which further connections were shared by each departments. Thus the speed was very limited. The server was confined to a single account for the entire departments. The departments and library were provided with limited net connection.

The system has been revamped in the year 2014 and the entire campus is connected through LAN through *wifi*. Every department is provided with *wifi* access via 18 access points. Also, individual account is provided to each user. The bandwidth has been enhanced to 14 MBPS. The system operates via centralized Operating System.

Each department is provided with a LCD projector, which is fixed permanently in a classroom. One of the seminar hall is provided with an interactive smart board apart from LCD projector, while the other seminar hall is provided with a fixed LCD projector. The college also possess efficient audio systems including collar microphones for recordings.

The library is partially automated, providing computerized catalogue. The catalogue provides title search, author search of the library stock. Internet connection is provided via LAN and *wifi* to ten terminals in the library for use of students and staff.

The college office is fully automated. The office has been linked through LAN and connected to internet server by OFC from first of January 2018. The office network is connected to centralized student database. The database is comprehensive carrying all possible information pertaining to each student. The service and Payroll details of each staff are linked to the State Government Service and Payroll Repository (SPARK) maintained with the Directorate of Treasury, Government of Kerala.

6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 The governance of the institution is reflective of an effective leadership in tune with the vision and mission of the institution

Response:

- The institution named after the great Saint and philosopher Adi Sankaracharya has the vision to perpetuate his memory and to nurture his birthplace as a cultural citadel. The Institution's mission is "to mould good citizens with ingenuity, adaptability, social commitment and ethical values" that can provide innovative leadership in all walks of life. In addition, the vision of Sree Sankara College is "to achieve excellence in higher Education, with a stress on, creativity, skill development, employability, personal values and human development."
- The formulation of action plan for the institution is done by the Management in consultation with all stakeholders. The implementation of the same is monitored by the college council and the IQAC.
- Every three months the Principal presents reports of the activities and programmes of all the departments and clubs to the Management.
- Stakeholders are consulted and needs are prioritised to redefine policies and plans. Feedback collected from parents, alumni, employers, etc. has been utilized in devising policies. Staff meetings are held regularly at college and departmental levels. College union activities are encouraged and their suggestions are given due attention.
- The management motivates and provides opportunities for staff and students to realize their potential. The culture of excellence is reinforced through inculcation of well-planned and student-centric education system supported by seminars, workshops and conferences.
- Offering innovative, job oriented self-financed programmes to promote employability of learners and self-sufficiency of the college.
- Promotes participative style of management through IQAC, Staff Council, HODs, committees, etc. coordinated by the Principal.

PERSPECTIVE PLAN

- Sree Sankara College has a perspective plan for development which envisions excellence in every sphere of education.
- A master plan with the vision for excellence by the year 2027-28 which marks the diamond jubilee of the college has been developed by the college management in consultation with the academia and other stakeholders. Certain areas have been identified as crucial to achieve excellence. These include: a) Infrastructural facilities b) Introduction of new courses c) Promoting research d) Innovative teaching learning strategies e) Green initiatives.

Participation of teachers in decision making bodies

- The Principal is assisted by the College Council and IQAC in addition to various clubs and committees.
- A staff advisor monitors the students' union activities.
- Staff Meetings: Decisions about curricular and extra-curricular activities are taken by the Principal

in consultation with faculty members.

- College Council: The College Council consists of all Heads of Department and Librarian in addition two elected members of the staff as per the University Statutes. The principal is the chairman of the council. The Staff Council meets frequently. Decisions regarding schedule of examinations, schedule of classes, disciplinary actions, etc. are taken in the College Council Meetings.
- IQAC meetings are regularly held. IQAC works towards quality enhancement and sustenance. It makes recommendations to improve the academic and administrative performance of the institution

6.1.2 The institution practices decentralization and participative management

Response:

- The institution strives to create a qualitative ambience in the campus by ensuring that the stakeholders participate in the academic and administrative bodies
- Various activities of the college are carried out through different committees under the guidance and supervision of the Principal
- The committees such as admission committee, discipline committee, anti-ragging cell, grievance redressal cell are formed with the participation of teachers for the proper functioning of the college
- Student participation is also ensured in the functioning of certain committees like cultural committee, women's cell
- The college union plays a prominent role in organizing and conducting student oriented programmes
- All the committees, clubs and cells of the college are internally coordinated and every member works with a sense of responsibility and accountability

Case study to show practice of decentralization and participative management in the institution.

The institution practices decentralization and participative management at different levels. One important area where the institution follows such a strategy is in relation to the internal assessment of students.

The internal examinations are conducted at the college level.

The principal monitors the entire internal assessment system. A committee to assist the principal in conducting the internal examinations is constituted. The committee takes the responsibility of scheduling the internal examinations, ensuring the smooth conduct of the examinations which includes collecting question papers from the respective departments. After the examinations, the internal exam committee takes the responsibility to distribute the answer sheets to the concerned departments. They make sure that the answer scripts are evaluated within the stipulated time and the collected mark sheets are handed over to the Principal. The principal with the assistance of the committee ensures that the internal assessment forms are filled as per the university statutes. The principal with the assistance of the committee verifies the filled in forms and they are then uploaded to the university website.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

Response:

Since inception in 2005, the IQAC has functioned as a crucial task force working towards effecting desirable changes in the academic arena. It has intervened in all the important areas, and has made significant contributions in every segment of the academic sphere with a view to ensure quality and to trigger quality concerns in formulating policies, planning, and effective implementation strategies to steer the institution towards eminence. For quality sustenance and quality enhancement, *Vidyasarani*, the quality statement of the IQAC has drawn up a broad framework which consists of Five Scalars:

SSC Scalar 2 – *Aavishkaar* - Introduction & Updating of Programmes

To keep abreast with the global trends in the educational scenario with focus on vocational and skill development, the IQAC felt it necessary to start new programmes incorporating vocational and skill development components in the UG Curriculum. It is with this vision that the college planned to start B.Voc programmes that would cater to the demands in the job sector. The proximity of the college to the International airport is another factor that led the IQAC to dwell on Tourism and Hospitality as one of the programmes for B.Voc. Sree Sankara College is the first affiliated College in Kerala to start B.Voc programmes under the Deen Dayal Upadhyay Kaushal Kendra. The B.Voc Renewable Energy and Management Programme has been granted affiliation by National Skill Development Council.

6.2.2 Organizational structure of the institution including governing body, administrative setup, and functions of various bodies, service rules, procedures, recruitment, promotional policies as well as grievance redressal mechanism

Response:

Sree Sankara College, an abode of knowledge, has as its patrons His Holiness Sri Sri Bharathitheertha Mahaswamigal and Sri Sri Vidhushekhara Bharathi Swamigal of Sringeri Mutt who guide and steer the administration of the College through a Board of Directors. Sree Sankara College Association consisting of the Board of Directors governs the college. The present Managing Director is Advocate K. Anand. The Principal of the college is an ex-officio member of the Board of Directors.

Sree Sankara College is affiliated to Mahatma Gandhi University, Kottayam, Kerala. The Principal is the head of the institution and is advised by the College Council. The College Council consists of the Principal, Heads of Department, two members elected from the teaching staff and the college librarian and IQAC co-ordinator. The office administration is headed by the principal and the organogram consist of Senior Superintend followed by Head Accountant, Upper Division Clerk, Lower Division Clerk, Typist and Office Attendants. As per the university statutes, the college council meets at least once a month to

decide various policies and to implement them.

The statutes of the university and government rules are followed in the regular appointment of the teaching and the non-teaching staff. The qualification and pay scales are as per the UGC and state government rules. Appointments are done as per UGC regulations.

The government paid and management paid staff on temporary basis is appointed by the committee/ Principal after advertising the post in leading dailies.

The college is under the direct payment by the Government of Kerala and therefore the government also has control over the affairs of the college.

A Grievance Redressal Cell for the employees has been constituted in 1998. However, no serious grievance has been reported. A cordial and healthy atmosphere prevails in the campus.

6.2.4 Effectiveness of various bodies/cells/committees is evident through minutes of meetings and implementation of their resolutions

Response:

The institution has a strategic plan to enhance research activities under the initiative of the IQAC. This has

been clearly defined in the quality statement of the IQAC 'Vidyasarani' as SSC Scalar 1 – Vigyan.

SSC Scalar 1 – Vigyan - Research Mobilization

A Research Committee was constituted under the initiative of IQAC with a vision to inculcate the value of research among the teachers and research scholars. The committee attempts to enhance the research skills in students by creating a favourable research climate. The committee monitors the progress done by the scholars in the respective fields. For the qualitative improvement of the teachers and scholars alike, the committee advises and encourages them to participate in various seminars and conferences. It also offers necessary guidance to all the interested scholars to publish their articles in the peer reviewed national and international research journals. It also informs the teachers regarding the faculty development programmes such as Orientation, Refresher, Flair and the like. The committee also supports the teachers to apply for financial assistance through funded projects, FIP, PDF etc.

The Research Committee played a key role in supporting the Science departments to apply for the FIST and SARD Scheme. The science departments of the institution were sanctioned with an infrastructural fund of Rs. 1 crore under the FIST scheme of DST in November 2014. Using the first phase grant, the research laboratories of the departments of Microbiology, Physics and Chemistry procured sophisticated research equipment thereby enhancing the research activities of teachers as well as students. The instruments are used by collaborating departments of neighbouring institutions also. Under the SARD scheme, the department of Microbiology was sanctioned with Rs. 25,07,133/- for infrastructural development in January 2014. A tissue culture lab was set up with the additional help of the Management Research Fund.

Four Major and twenty-one Minor research funding proposals were sanctioned. Five funded student projects were also sanctioned.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 The institution has effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff

Response:

The welfare measures such as pension, medical and other aids instituted by the Government are given on time.

- Being an aided College, the salary and welfare scheme of faculty and supportive staff are paid under the norms of UGC and the State Government. However, the management provides additional support to the staff during crisis.
- A government approved financial institution called Sree Sankara College Staff Co-operative Society Ltd No E642 caters to the financial well-being of the members of the staff. It mobilizes the savings of teachers and non-teaching staff. It also gives loans such as education loan, personal loan etc. The society has 134 members with a working capital of Rs. 12.5 crores. The Society is capable of meeting almost all financial requirements of the staff. Loans are given at a low interest rate of 10%. It has instituted Scholarships for the benefit of the children of the staff members.
- A travel desk functions at the college which assists the faculty, administrative staff, and students to organize educational tours, study trips and pleasure trips.

- The playground and other facilities for sports and games are also made available to the staff. Friendly matches and competitions for staff are conducted.
- All statutory welfare schemes such as Provident fund, pension scheme, group insurance, family benefit scheme, state life insurance etc. have been implemented.

The college has a self-appraisal method to evaluate the performance of the faculty in teaching, research and extension activities. The appraisal reports are submitted at the end of every year.

The student appraisal of the teacher performance is done in all the departments. Teacher quality is analysed with respect to various criteria and is maintained by the IQAC. Lapses are discussed in private and improvements suggested.

The performance of the non-teaching staff is appraised informally by the Principal. The Service Books of both teaching and non-teaching staff are properly maintained and monitored.

6.4.3 Institutional strategies for mobilisation of funds and the optimal utilisation of resources

Response:

The college is a Government grant-in aid institution and thus avails government funding. Sree Sankara College is recognized by UGC under 2f & 12B of the UGC act of 1956 and hence it gets the general development grant in every five-year plan. The college also receives the other grants under various schemes of the UGC from time to time.

The donation from the Sringeri Mutt and Bharaththeertha Educational Society towards the corpus and from Sree Sankara College Association add to the capital fund. Interest free deposits are graciously forwarded by the Directors.

Thus, the main income of the college is:

1. Grant-in aid (Salary for regular staff)

2. Maintenance Grant
3. Library, laboratory grant from fees
4. Tuition and other fees collected from the regular, self-financing and B. Voc. programmes.
5. Donations from Sringeri Mutt, well-wishers.
6. Funds from various funding agencies of state and central Government – to organize international/national seminars and undertake research projects.

Fees for self-financing courses per student per semester is - B Sc. self-financing programmes 19500/-, M Sc. Biochemistry 42000/- and Environmental Science and Management 10000/-. For B Voc. programmes it is 11500/- for tourism and Hospitality, 18750/- for Broadcasting and Journalism and 18500/- for Renewable Energy and Management.

The available physical infrastructure is optimally utilised

1. Classrooms are allocated based on the academic schedule and general time table.
2. Auditorium and seminar halls are available to department level programmes on a priority basis.
3. Staff and students utilize the facilities of the indoor stadium.
4. Playground is utilized by the public and sister institutions for sports/games and tournaments.
5. Laboratories are allocated to different batches based on a predetermined schedule.
6. Classrooms are utilized for conducting university and PSC examinations.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

Using the first phase grant, the research laboratories of the Departments of Microbiology, Physics and Chemistry procured sophisticated research equipment thereby enhancing the research activities of teachers as well as students. The instruments are used by collaborating departments of neighbouring institutions also. Under the SARD scheme, the department of Microbiology was sanctioned with Rs. 25,07,133/- for infrastructural development in January 2014.

2. SSC Scalar 2 - Aavishkar - Introduction & Updating of Programmes

To keep abreast of the global trends in the educational scenario with focus on vocational and skill development, the IQAC felt it necessary to start new programmes incorporating vocational and skill development components in the UG Curriculum. It is with this vision that the college planned to start B Voc. programmes that would cater to the demands in the job sector. Sree Sankara College is the first affiliated College in Kerala to start B Voc. programmes under the Deen Dayal Upadhyay Kaushal Kendra.

The IQAC believes that the College has progressed by channelizing its policies and procedures for fulfilling the needs of its stakeholders and has played a key role in the introduction of various programmes. Taking into consideration the demand rate especially for B Com. programmes and based on the stakeholder feedback, the IQAC put forth a proposal to the management for the introduction of two UG Programmes, one PG Programme and upgradation of three departments into Research Centres. UG programme in B Com. Computer Application has been added. An Add – On programme on Diploma in Computer Applications was conducted successfully under the State Resource Centre, Government of Kerala.

The IQAC ensures maintenance of the quality of the teaching learning process to propel continuous improvement. It conducts review meeting with the various departments to assess the progress in academics.

Exhibitions, debates, quiz, workshops, and competitions are held. Extension activities of the departments involve the students of the schools in the neighbourhood.

Sree Sankara College is the first affiliated College in Kerala to start B Voc. programmes under the Deen Dayal Upadhyay Kaushal Kendra. The B Voc. Renewable Energy and Management Programme has been granted affiliation by National Skill Development Council through Skill Council for Green Jobs. Majority of the total students being women, the institution takes keen interest in promoting women-welfare programmes and runs a counselling centre for women, "Sakhi", which is actively involved in this direction. Sakhi, initiated in the academic year 2006-07, undertaken as per No. DSS/WC/06-07 dated 18.10.2006, works according to the rules and regulations of the Department of Students' Services, Mahatma Gandhi University, Kottayam.

The focus points of Sakhi are:

Gender sensitive facilities:

The College emphasises on the importance of all round development of women for the betterment of society.

Utmost care is taken towards the safety and security of women in the campus. The campus is surrounded by compound walls. Surveillance cameras are installed at various points in the campus. Security personnel are employed twenty-four hours in the campus. Awareness classes on topics such as sexual and domestic violence, cyber rules and cyber-crimes are conducted.

- Counselling

“Sakhi”, functions with a mission to “empower student community, especially the girl students, physically, mentally, emotionally and intellectually and to enable them face the challenges they might encounter in their future life”. Sakhi functions with a vision to awake the innate strength of every woman and develop her potential to its zenith so that no woman shall limit her achievements or aspirations to any single facet of life.

Sakhi organizes talks on women empowerment, legal provisions for protection against domestic abuse, sexual abuse, role of women in protecting natural environment. In addition, it organizes vocational trainings and skill development courses, such as jewellery designing, fabric painting, soft toy making, bag making. Awareness classes are also conducted on sex education, female reproductive health, general health and hygiene, and the like by doctors and health officials.

To inculcate in students the quality of social commitment, they are taken to old age homes and orphanages occasionally, where they spend quality time with the inmates and also offer them financial and material aid.

Eminent ladies from different walks of life are invited to the campus to interact with the students with a view to boost their morale and motivate them to aspire for higher positions in the society.

Common Room

Construction of a common room is under consideration in the upcoming infrastructure development projects.

In addition, various departments conduct seminars and invited talks on gender issues, women empowerment, legal perspectives, etc. for the benefit of girl students. A course on “Women’s Literature” is offered by the Dept. of English to their core students, as part of the curriculum. Through the activities of NSS, NCC, etc, male students also get an opportunity to become aware of their responsibilities and duties to keep themselves safe from the evils of society and to ensure safety and respect to their female counterparts.

As an initiative of Bhoomitrasena Club, the institution has installed a biogas plant to process the biodegradable wastes. Vermicomposting is carried out for efficient solid waste management. Of the biodegradable waste generated, about 50% is used in biogas plant and the rest is composted/used in vegetable garden.

Bhoomitrasena Club, has placed waste bins at various corners in the campus, to collect plastic and other non-degradable waste. These wastes are given to rag pickers. Awareness classes are organized by the institution in association with Bhoomitrasena Club and other departments, to make useful things from non-degradable waste materials. Plan@Earth, a non-governmental Organisation conducted classes on waste management. A student group - MAC (Make A Change) has created curios and utility items out of plastic and other non-biodegradable wastes and has collected money from it. This has been contributed for charity activities.

Sree Sankara college, Kalady is situated at a geographically elevated location and its natural that acute water shortage is faced by the students and staff, during summer season, in particular. In this context, Kerala being blessed with two monsoon seasons, water harvesting is a very efficient and convenient technique for a solution. The institution has built up a rainwater harvesting system as a joint venture of Sree Sankara College and its sister concern Adi Sankara Institute of Engineering and Technology. The

capacity of the rain water harvesting tank is 16,00,000 litres and the water channelled along rooftops is harvested and used. The system is fully operational during monsoon seasons. Academic and administrative: The goals and objectives of the college are translated into reality under the dynamic leadership of the Principal with the full support of the management, teaching and non-teaching staff. The principal is the academic and administrative head and is also responsible for the academic and financial management.

- The principal adopts a transparent and participatory management approach. Various committees constituted to plan, guide and supervise different activities associated with the functioning of the college. Students are also involved in many committees as nominated representatives.
- The statutes of the university and government rules are followed in the regular appointment of the teaching and the non teaching staff. The qualification and pay scales are as per the UGC and state government rules. Appointments are conducted on the basis of an interview conducted by a committee comprising of the Principal, representative of the management, subject expert and government nominee.
- The college is under the direct payment by the Govt of Kerala and therefore the government also has control over the affairs of the college.

7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 Describe/Explain the performance of the institution in one area distinctive to its vision, priority and thrust

Response:

The institution named after the great Saint and philosopher Jagadguru Adi Sankaracharya has the vision to perpetuate his memory and to nurture his birthplace as a cultural citadel. The Institution's mission is "to mould good citizens with ingenuity, adaptability social commitment and ethical values" that can provide innovative leadership in all walks of life. In addition, the vision of Sree Sankara College is "to achieve excellence in higher education, with a stress on, creativity, skill development, employability, personal values and human development." Thus we impart 'Vidya' to the students which kindles an undying spiritual and intellectual enlightenment, fulfilling our motto that 'Vidya' alone leads to 'Amruthathva' – the Supreme Realisation. The institution gives thrust to Advaita Vedanta - the doctrines of Adi Sankara after whom the institution is named - in the Sanskrit undergraduate and post graduate programmes. The department also publishes a research journal Sadvidya which is in tune with the motto of the institution. The Department of Sanskrit in association with Thrikkaikkaattu Swamiyar Madom is involved in disseminating Indian philosophy, Sanskrit language and literature to common man, through weekly contact classes. The course is designed for three years and the classes are conducted in three batches, with an average enrolment of 70 students every year. The admission is open to all irrespective of caste, creed, gender and age. Experts including faculty members from the department handle the classes. The Department is involved in the conservation of invaluable palm-leaf manuscripts through

digitisation. The Department already possesses over 7000 folios of such digitized manuscripts, thus saving a large number of manuscripts from destruction. The students are also trained for doing this practice. The team visits local families who possess the manuscripts and starts the digitizing procedure then and there.

The students of Sanskrit are involved in the activities of Samskrta Bharati – Viswa Samskrta Prathishthanam" which is a National foundation with International reach for the propagation of Sanskrit and Indian Culture. Besides the department has started a programme named, Samskrata Sambhashana Sibiram which envisages to equip students with better communication skill in Sanskrit. The system essentially involves Oral training, at the end of which, the student becomes capable of communicating in Sanskrit in day to day affairs. The latest programme was handled by Sri. Abhijith, Samskrta Bharati and 40 students participated.

The Department envisages to start a trimonthly periodical in Sanskrit to attract students in propagating the Sanskrit philosophy, language and literature. For this, the students will be involved in communicating with experts, collecting articles, editing them, etc.

The Department of Sanskrit observes Gurupoornima Day and Sankara Jayanthi day every year, to instil the awareness of Indian heritage and values in students. Sanskrit Day is also observed every year to make the students feel responsible of propagating Sanskrit language. Thus, the Department of Sanskrit caters to the intellectual development of the students and also conducts programmes for the propagation of Sanskrit.
